Profile

Hudaco Industries is a South African group specialising in the importation and distribution of a broad range of high-quality, branded automotive, industrial and electronic consumable products, mainly in the southern African region. Its businesses fall into the following categories:

Hudaco sources branded products, mainly on an exclusive basis, directly from leading international manufacturers and to a lesser extent from local manufacturers. Hudaco seeks out niche areas in markets where customers need, and are prepared to pay for, the value Hudaco adds to the products it distributes.

The value added includes product specification, technical advice, application and installation training and troubleshooting, combined with ready availability at a fair price. The group has a network of specialised branches and independent distributors throughout southern Africa to ensure product availability to its customers.

Hudaco's black employees own a 15% equity interest in all Hudaco businesses, except for DD Power, in which Deutz AG has a 30% share.

Overview

The trading environment in South Africa during the first half of the year became increasingly challenging, characterised by low business and consumer confidence stemming from the crisis in the Middle East, elevated fuel prices, soaring inflation, and higher interest rates. The rise in fuel prices has been reflected in product prices, further exacerbating inflation.

As detailed in an announcement on SENS on 30 June 2026, we have discontinued our alternative energy business and the battery bay management and battery service business within Eternity Technologies. We had previously informed the market that these businesses were underperforming and that their future was under review. They have been classified as discontinued operations in these interim results. The costs of discontinuance are predominantly the impairment of inventory paid for two to three years ago, which does not involve an outflow of cash on closure. The cash outflow from discontinued operations was R24 million. This means that these hitherto loss-making operations will neither be a drag on group performance any longer nor absorb important management attention.

Results from continuing operations

We are very pleased with the first half results from continuing operations. The group's turnover has increased by 9.5% to R4.2 billion, and operating profit has increased by 11.2% to R485 million. This was achieved through rigorous management of gross margins and operational costs. The result was a modest but pleasing increase in the operating margin for the first half, from 11.3% to 11.5%.

Comparable earnings per share increased by 12.4% to 978 cents, while from continuing operations, both headline earnings per share and basic earnings per share were essentially unchanged at 978 cents and 979 cents, respectively. The interim dividend has been increased by 10% to 385 cents per share. This dividend aligns with our policy of being covered approximately 2.0 times by comparable earnings annually.

Cash generation was strong, as it usually is. Trading activities in the first six months generated a cash inflow of R616 million, of which R138 million was invested in working capital. As a result, operating activities generated R478 million in cash before we paid R113 million in taxes. We also paid R35 million in finance expenses, R80 million

in premises lease payments, and R44 million in share-based compensation. Additionally, R79 million was invested in property, plant and equipment, and R12 million was paid to vendors of recent acquisitions. Dividends totalling R233 million were paid. At the end of the first half, net borrowings of R654 million remain comfortably within the limits set by our conservative financial guidelines and the available banking facilities of R2.1 billion. Assuming there are no new acquisitions this year, borrowings should reduce significantly by year-end through the anticipated strong cash inflow during the typically busier second half of the financial year.

Consumer-related products

There are twelve businesses in this segment, which generated 42% of group sales and 45% of operating profit from continuing operations. This segment has delivered a good result despite weak economic conditions and increased pressure on consumers. Excluding discontinued operations, segment sales increased by 2.7% to R1.8 billion, and the operating margin rose from 12.5% to 13.2%, resulting in a 8.8% increase in operating profit to R236 million. We have been successful in protecting our margins by passing on increases in logistics costs but volumes have been negatively impacted.

Engineering consumables

Twenty one businesses make up this segment, which has shown resilience in recent years, generating 58% of group sales and 55% of operating profit from continuing operations. The segment benefited from the 2025 acquisitions in a very challenging first half. Overall, segment turnover increased by 15.3%, and operating profit rose by 19.3% to R291 million. The operating margin improved by 0.4 percentage points to 11.9%, up from 11.5% in the first half of 2025.

Excluding the businesses acquired during 2025, so on a like-for-like basis, engineering consumables saw turnover increase by 2.4% to R2.1 billion, and operating profit increase by 2.1% to R244 million. The Isotec and FloSolve acquisitions contributed R313 million to turnover and R47 million to operating profit.

Prospects

We are cautiously optimistic for the second half of the year despite ongoing geopolitical risks and the current economic climate.

Hudaco is resilient and our businesses typically perform better in the second half. We expect to benefit from management not having the distraction of the discontinued operations in the second half of the year.

We will adhere to our long-term strategy of maintaining a diversified portfolio of high-margin, cash-generating businesses. These businesses generate the cash flow that enables us to pay attractive dividends and pursue value-adding acquisitions, thereby supporting earnings growth, as evidenced by the contributions from Isotec and FloSolve in this half's results. As always, we will navigate our way through tough economic times by staying focused on the factors within our control, such as gross margins, expense ratios and working capital.

Our existing businesses remain well-positioned to capitalise rapidly on any improvement in market conditions. Hudaco's strong balance sheet enables continued strategic capital allocation so quality, accretive acquisitions and the potential repurchase of Hudaco shares are always under consideration.

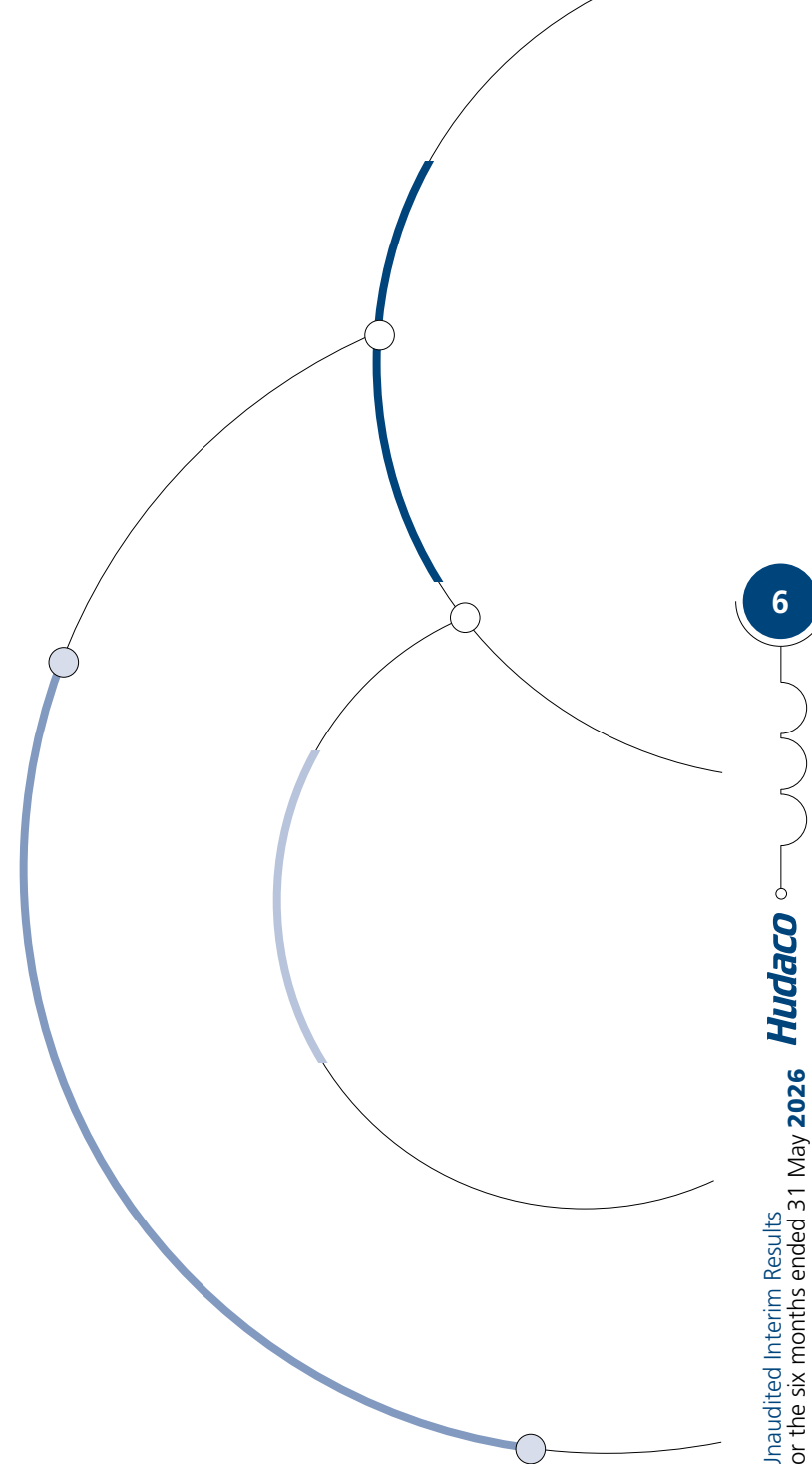

Basis of preparation

The condensed consolidated interim financial statements are prepared in accordance with the requirements of the JSE Listings Requirements for interim reports, and the requirements of the Companies Act of South Africa. The JSE Listings Requirements require interim reports to be prepared in accordance with and containing the information required by IAS 34: Interim Financial Reporting, as well as the SAICA Financial Reporting Guides, as issued by the Accounting Practices Committee and Financial Pronouncements, as issued by Financial Reporting Standards Council. The accounting policies applied in the preparation of the condensed consolidated interim financial statements are in terms of International Financial Reporting Standards and are consistent with those applied in the preparation of the group annual financial statements for the year ended November 2025. The condensed consolidated interim financial statements have been prepared on the going concern and historical cost bases, except where otherwise indicated. The presentation currency is the South African Rand, rounded to the nearest million, except where otherwise indicated. These results have been compiled under the supervision of the financial director, CV Amoils, CA (SA). The directors of Hudaco take full responsibility for the preparation of this report.

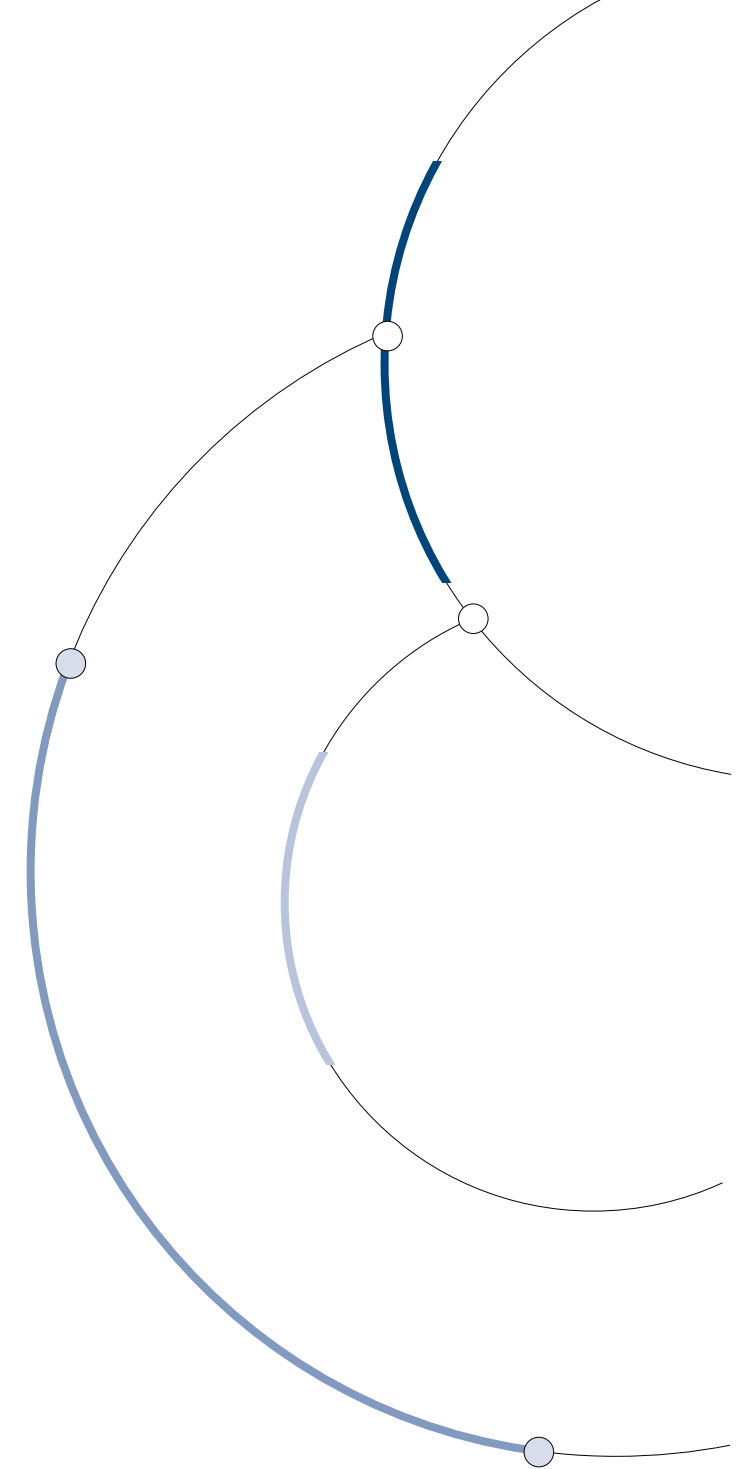
